



Women's Squad Profiles

T. Andrews (Richmond) Lock. Born 4.1.77 in Pembrokeshire. 6ft, 13st. Teresa Joan Andrews, who was educated at Pembroke Comprehensive, Birmingham University (BSc Sports Science) and the University of Wales, Bangor (PGCE Outdoor Education and Maths), has won 14 caps for England. From 1992-98 she represented Wales as an athlete, competing in the high jump and heptathlon events. Andrews began her rugby career in 1995 as a student in Birmingham and joined Premier Division One side Waterloo in 1998, where sheplayed for two seasons before transferring to Richmond in 2000. She was first selected for England Students in 1997, before progressing quickly through Emerging England and into the senior England squad by the end of 1998. She is a PE and Maths teacher at Glyn School in Ewell. Surrey. International Record: 14 caps

S. Appleby (Clifton) Fly-half. Born 21.12.70 in Newcastle. 5ft 6in, 9st 5lb. Susan Kathryn Appleby, who was educated at Westfield School in Newcastle, Repton School in Derbyshire and Birmingham University (BA Sport and Recreation Studies), has won 35 caps for England. A sportswoman from an early age, she competed at county level in netball, swimming, long jump and javelin before taking up rugby in 1991 as a student at Birmingham. While still a student she was selected to represent the Midlands Division in 1992, and England Students in 1993 at fly-half. After finishing her degree in 1993 she joined Novocastrians as a scrum-half, where she helped them win promotion to the First Division in 1995. In 1994 she played one game for Emerging England before being promoted to the senior England Squad. She played for Saracens from 1996-99 and in 1999 transferred to West Country club Clifton. She is currently on a career break from the police force and is a full-time rugby player.

International Record. 35 caps, 5 Sevens caps

G. Burns (Waterloo) No.8/Lock. Born 12.7.64 in Whiston, Merseyside. 5ft 11in., 13st. Gillian Ann Burns, who was educated at Prescot Comprehensive and Chester College (B.Ed. Hon. Physical Education and Mathematics), captained the England team from 1994 to 1999. Before turning to rugby in 1987 she competed at county level at swimming, hockey, and athletics. She also represented British Colleges at Hockey, Basketball, Swimming and Athletics. She took up rugby in 1987 and had been selected for England by 1988, winning her first cap against Sweden in that year. She was a founding member of Waterloo WRFC, where she has played since 1989. One of England's most experienced forwards and a great attacking weapon. She is a PE teacher for Sefton Education Authority and is currently Vice-President of the Women's Sports Federation.

International Record: 57 caps, 5 Sevens Caps, 68 2 caps

- H. Clayton (Saracens) Flanker. Born 17.6.71 in Wigan, Lancashire. 5ft 6in., 11st. Helen Victoria Clayton, who was educated at Upholland High School, Winstanley College in Wigan and Chester College (BA History and PE), has won 39 caps for England. A member of the England A team and a travelling reserve for the World Cup in 1994, she earned her first cap against the Netherlands the same year. She began her rugby career in 1991 when she helped to establish the first women's side at Chester College, then moving on to play for Waterloo. She quickly gained representative honours, playing for the North in 1992, England Students in 1993 and Emerging England in 1994 before her elevation into the full squad. Although her first sporting achievements were in hockey (she represented Greater Manchester and Cheshire from 1991 to 1993), she comes from a rugby family. Brothers Paul and Jerome have both played for the North. She is a part-time coach for Southwark Sports Development. International Record: 39 caps, 6 Sevens caps
- N. Coffin (Richmond) Flanker. Born 26.9.74 in Southampton. 5ft 7in, 11st. Nicola Ruth Coffin, who was educated at Blundell's School in Tiverton, Devon, and the West London Institute (BSC Sports Science and Leisure Management), has won 13 caps for England. Having been introduced to rugby at school, she returned to the game as a university student at West London Institute in 1992 on the wing. She took the opportunity while a student to play for London club Wasps and was selected for England Students from 1992 to 1994 as a fullback and centre. In 1994 she transferred to London club Richmond, and began to represent the South Division and Emerging England as a fullback. She was brought into the senior England squad in 1995. She won her first 7 caps as a centre in 1997. Aftre a break from injury, she returned to the squad in 1999 and changed position to flanker. She has since won several caps for England in that position. She is a recruitment consultant for JPA. International Record: 13 caps
- N. Crawford (Worcester) Wing. Born 20.11.71 in Worcester. 5ft 7in, 10st 7lbs. Nicola Jayne Crawford (née Brown), who was educated at St Mary's Convent School Worcester. Worcester Sixth Form College, Worcester Technical College, the University of the West of England (BA Graphic Design) and Cardiff Institute for Higher Education (PGCE Art and Design), has won 24 caps for England. She began her rugby career in 1993 with Pershore WRFC before transferring to Worcester in 1994. In 1994 she was selected for the Midlands Division and the following year for Emerging England and England Students. She joined the full England squad in 1997. Previously a nationally ranked tetrathlete. She is an Art Teacher at the Arden School in Solihull. International Record. 24 caps
- S. Day (Wasps) Centre. Born 29.10.72 in Watford. 5ft, 7in. 11st. Susan Margaret Day, who was educated at the Grange School in Stourbridge and Oxford University (BA Modern Languages), has won 15 caps for England. She began her rugby career playing for Spanish club Buc in Barcelona while on a year abroad in 1993-94 and her natural talent led to her selection for Catalonia in the same year. Upon her return to England she won a blue with Oxford University before joining London club Wasps. She represented the London Division in 1996 and played for Emerging England in 1997 before her inclusion in the full England squad. In 1997 she represented England against the Nomads and won her first cap against Spain. She won further caps in the Home Nations tournament of 1998 and as a member of England's World Cup squad in Amsterdam. RFUW Club Player of the Year in 1997-98. She is a part-time accountant for KPMG in London. International Record. 15 caps
- A. De Biase (Saracens via Weston Hornets) Centre. Born 27.5.69 in Colchester. 5ft 7in, 11st 9lbs. Assunta De Biase, who was educated at 5ir Charles Lucas School in Colchester, Nottingham Polytechnic (BSc Sports Science) and Bath University (PGCE in Physical Education), joined the senior England squad in 1997. She began her rugby career in 1991 with Essex University, before moving in 1994 to West country club Weston Hornets. When she moved to London in 1995 she first played for Eton Manor before joining Premier Division One club Saracens in 1996. 1995 saw her first foray into representative rugby, when she was selected for the London Division and for Emerging England. After impressing in divisional matches and on the summer's England A team tour of Holland and Germany in 1996 she was selected for the senior squad. She represented England against the Nomads in October and won her first cap against Spain in December 1997. She is a Sports Development Officer in the London Borough of Southwark. International Record. 12 caps
- E. Feltham (Richmond)Wing. Born 17.8.77 in Salisbury. 5ft 3in, 10st. Emily Claire Feltham, who was educated at St Edmund's Girls School and South Wiltshire Grammar, has won 9 caps for England. She is a relatively recent convert to rugby, having only begun her playing career for the University of St Mark and St John in Plymouth, 'Marjons', in 1995. From 1992-93 she was an England junior squad athlete competing at 100m, 200m and long jump. She was selected for England Students Rugby in 1996 and was elevated to the senior England squad in 1998. In 1999 she won her first cap against Wales in the Five Nations. The same year she moved to London and now plays for First Division club Richmond. She is a PE teacher at Leaden Hall School in Salisbury. International Record: 9 caps

M. Edwards (Saracens) Prop. Born 28.7.66 in Beckenham, Kent. 5ft 5in, 12st. Maxine Patricia Etdwards, who was seducated at the Lewisham School, Hackney College (electrical apprenticeship). Paddington College (8.1-6b. Communications Engineering) and the University of Greenwich (16St Hons. Business Information Systems), has earned a total of 20 caps for England, 4 as a flanker and 16 as a prop. She began playing rugby in 1984 for now defunct Bromley WRFC which became Blackheath WRFC in 1991. She was selected in 1988 to represent the South Division and was brought onto the England squad as a flanker in 1990. In 1991 she played for England in the first World Cup, and then later that year had a child and withdrew from the squad until she was re-selected in 1994. In 1997 she transferred from Blackheath to Premier Division One club Saracens and from the no.7 shift to no.3. Recent achievements include captaining the victorious team in the 2000 inaugural English Super Fours. She is currently employed by 8T as a 5he is currently employed by 8T as a 5he is currently employed by 8T as a 8he shees Analyst. International Record: 20 caps

C. Frost (Saracens) No.8. Born 22.3.73 in Astington, Northumberland, 5ft 8in, 13st 7lbs. Claire Doanne Frost, who was educated at the Evesham High School near Worcester and the University of Greenvich (B.Ed. Hon. in Movement Studies), has won 17 caps for England. She began her rugby career as a student at Greenwich in 1991 and was called up to represent the London Division in her second season. In 1993-94 she joined Premier Division One club Saracens and was shortly after selected for England Students and Emerging England. In the same year she was brought up to join the senior England squad. She represented England against the Nomads in October and won her first cap against Spain in December 1997. She is a Deputy Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator at Warnvick School for Boys in London. International Corect. 17 caps

A. Garnett (Saracens) Hooker. Born 31.3.76 in Canterbury. 5ft. 7in, 11st. Amy Garnett, who was educated at Barton Court Grammar School in Canterbury; Liverpool John Moores University and De Montfort University Bedford (B.SC Sports Science and Geography), has won 10 caps for England. She began her rugby career as a student at Liverpool John Moores University in 1994 and transferred to De Montfort University in 1996. In 1996 she was selected for England Students and the Hidlands Division. In 1997 she joined Emerging England and in 1998 she joined Premier Division One club Saracens, represented the London Division and was selected for the senior England squad. She won her first cap as a replacement against Spain in 2000. She is Computer Data Analyst for Randon House Limited Publishing Company. International Record: 10 cap.

We are committed to providing sport for all, regardless of ability, gender or age, at Worcester Rugby and the women's section are a major part of the club's continued success and expansion. We look forward to an enjoyable afternoon of women's rugby."

England Women's Rugby Squad Player Profiles

P. George (Wasps) Fullback. Born 20.10.68 in Abergavenny. 5ft 10in., 12st. Paula George, who was educated at Cynffig Comprehensive in Mid-Glamorgan, Cardiff Institute (BA Hon. Human Movement Studies) and Brunel University (PGCE in Physical Education and Special Needs), is England's captain and fullback. She has won 47 caps for England, though her international experience is deeper as she was previously capped 5 times for Wales. She started playing rugby at Newport as an outside centre in 1989 and was at the same time representing Wales at netball. In 1991 she was selected for the Welsh squad as a wing and played for Wales in the first World Cup. Later that year she moved to London and transferred from Newport to Richmond. After a season at Richmond she transferred to London rivals Wasps. In 1992 she retired from netball to focus on rugby and decided to transfer to England. During a mandatory two year exile from international rugby, she represented the Nomads in their first two international matches. She made her first appearance for England against Wales in 1994 and has taken part in the last three World Cups. Current England captain. She is a professional rugby player and a part-time teacher at Vyners School in Ickenham. International Record: 47 caps, 6 Sevens caps, 5 caps for Wales

N. Goodwin (Worcester) Prop. Born 27.3.74 in Hereford. 5ft óin, 10st. Nicola Claire Goodwin, who was educated at Haberdashers' Monmouth School for Girls, Loughborough University (BA Hons English and PE; PGCE English and PE) and the National College of Trainee Journalists in Cheltenham (NCTJ certificate), has not yet been capped for England. She first turned to rugby in 1991 whilst also representing the Welsh Schools at Lacrosse. After a brief stint with Hereford from 1991-92, she joined Loughborough as a student from 1992-96. She was first selected for England Students in 1995. In 1996 she joined Premier Division One club Worcester and became captain of England Students. She was then elevated to Emerging England in 1997, which she also captained until 1998 when she joined the senior England squad. She is the Press and PR Officer at Worcester RFC, a freelance rugby journalist and is also the RFUW Press Officer. International Record: O caps

V. Huxford (Wasps) Prop. Born 13.10.70 in Hanworth, Middlesex. 5ft 7in, 13st 2lbs. Vanessa Huxford, who was educated at Tomlinscote Senior School in Camberley, has won 17 caps for England. Having first joined Alton as a back row forward in 1993, she was then called upon to play no.8 for Hampshire County and the South East Region the following year. In 1995 she was selected for the Emerging England squad. She transferred to Premier Division One club Richmond in 1996 to play as a prop for the first time and in 1996-97 was a member of the South Divisional squad. In 1997 she transfered again to join Premier Division One club Wasps and was called up for the senior England squad in the same year. She played for an England Select side against the Nomads in 1997. In 1998 she was a travelling reserve for the World Cup in Holland and she won her first cap in the Five nations of 1999 against Scotland. She works at the Bass brewery in Alton. International Record. 17 caps

- S. Marsh (Wasps) Centre. Born 6.9.76 in Canterbury. 5ft 11in, 11st 1lb. Sarah Jane Marsh, who was educated at the Astor Secondary School in Dover and is currently studying at Brunel University (BSc Sports Science and Leisure Management), won her first cap at the Canada Cup in 2000. Marsh was no stranger to contact sports when she began her rugby career. From 1994-96 she represented Great Britain at kickboxing and held both the British and English Light Middleweight titles. She also played hockey for the East of England U21s. She began her rugby career in 1995 with Canterbury, before moving to Harlequins in 1996. In 1999 she transferred to First Division club Richmondand then in 200 to Premiership rivals Wasps. Her progress has been swift. She was selected for English Universities in 1998, the South and Emerging England in 1999 and the senior England squad in 2000. She is a part-time fitness instructor and professional rugby player. *International Record*: 1 cap
- T. O'Reilly (Saracens) Prop. Born 16.9.64 in Wexford, Ireland. 5ft 6in, 11st 7lbs. Theresa Jane O'Reilly, who was educated at Hengrove Comprehensive School in Bristol, Brunel Technical College (City and Guilds) and South Bank University (HND), has won 24 caps for England. She began her rugby career with Bath Ladies in 1991 as a flanker and the following season was selected to represent the South Division. In 1993 she transferred from Bath to Clifton and then in 1997 to London club Saracens. She was by then playing most games as a prop. In 1997 she was selected for Emerging England and after a successful tour to Holland and Germany was elevated to the senior England squad. A successful power athlete, from 1978-82 she was the UK Junior Champion in discus and javelin, heavyweight British Karate Champion from 1982-86 and European heavyweight Karate Champion from 1984-86. She is a freelance Contract Manager and is currently completing a BSc in Building Surveying (Chartered) at South Bank University. International Record. 24 caps
- S. Rudge (Clifton) Centre. Born 5.11.75 in Auckland, New Zealand. 5ft 3in, 12st. Selena Helen Rudge, who was educated at Glendowie College in Auckland, has won 7 caps for England. Rudge began her rugby career early. At the age of 8 she played rugby league with Tamaki RFC in Auckland for two years before being told, as a girl, she could no longer play. She returned to league with the women's clubs the Ellerlie Eagles, Packuranga, the Glenora Bears and Bay Roskill in New Zealand from 1993-98. She came to England in 1999 and took up rugby union first with Cheltenham Ladies before transferring to Clifton for the 1999-2000 season. Rudge made an immediate impact and was selected for both the South Division and England in November 1999. She is a full time rugby player. International Record: 7 caps
- S. Rae (Wasps) Fly Half. Born 1.6.76 in Cambridge. 5ft 9in, 11st. Shelley Ann Rae, who was educated at the Netherhall School in Cambridge, has won 3 caps for England. She first played rugby for Cambridge club Shelford in 1995, after having previously been involved in football, basketball and badminton. Selected for the London Division in 1996 and then for Emerging England and straight into the full England squad in 1997, she won her first A team cap against Wales in the same year. She transferred to Premier Division One club Wasps in 1998 and won her first three caps at the Canada Cup in 2000. She is a professional rugby player.

International Record: 3 caps

- G. Stevens (Clifton) Flanker. Born 13.6.73 in Torquay. 5ft 7in, 11st 7lbs. Georgia Ruth Stevens, who was educated at Wyedean Comprehensive and Bridlemaking School, has won 23 caps for England. She began her rugby career at Lydney WRFC in 1992 before joining Clifton WRFC in 1994. She was selected to play for the South Division and Emerging England in 1995 and was elevated to the senior England squad in 1997. She has represented England 'A' against both the Welsh and Scottish Exiles before winning her first cap against Scotland in 1998. She was a member of the England World Cup squad in the same year. She is currently a student at the University of Wales Institute, Cardiff (UWIC).

 International Record. 23 caps
- 3. Sutton (Richmond) Lock. Born 26.2.69 in Norman, Oklahoma, USA. 6ft 2in, 13st. Jennifer Shelby Sutton, who was educated at Steveston High School and the University of Victoria in British Colombia, Canada (B.Commerce and Economics), has won 10 caps for England. Previously an international basketball player for Canada, she is no stranger to the top echelons of women's sport. After an extremely successful basketball career during which she was named Canadian Universities Most Valubale Player, she turned to rugby for the first time in 1994. After one season with the University of Victoria she traveled to England to join Premier Division One club Richmond. She was named in the Canadian squad in 1994 and 1997 though was never capped. Having decided to reside permanently in London, she made herself available to England and joined the senior England squad in 1998. She works in E-commerce Business Development with GE Capital.

 International Record: 10 caps
- J. Yapp (Worcester) Scrum-half. Born 6.9.79 in Shrewsbury. 5ft 3in, 9st. Joanne Yapp, who was educated at the Lacon Childe School, is currently the youngest member of the England squad. She began playing rugby at age 13 for Ludlow Ladies RFC and then in 1994 transferred to Worcester. In 1995 she was selected by the West Midlands Regional squad and has played for the Midlands Division since 1996. In 1996 she represented England Students and in 1997 joined the senior England Squad. She had a dream debut for England when she scored a try at her home club Worcester against Ireland in 1998 and was with the England squad at the 1998 World Cup in Amsterdam. She has also represented Britain at tetrathalon. She is currently a student at Worcester University working for a BSc in Sports Studies. International Record. 21 caps

Introducing the Chief Executive of Worcester RFC



A very warm welcome to Sixways the home of Worcester Rugby for today's encounter between England and Spain in the Six Nations Championship. There have been two previous England women's international matches here at Worcester, against Ireland in 1998 and France in 1999. England won on both of those occasions so perhaps that is a good omen for today. The English team won the Five nations trophy in 1999-2000 and also enjoyed a successful tour to Canada last September, beating both the USA and Canada and only losing narrowly to the current World Champions, New Zealand.

This is the first season in which six nations have taken part in this tournament. Ireland have returned to the fold after a year out to rebuild their domestic game and Spain, their temporary replacements in the Five Nations last year, did so well that they are included by right this season. England start as favourites today and for the tournament as they build towards their summer tour of Australia & New Zealand and the 2002 World Cup due to be held in Barcelona.

Women's rugby has developed dramatically during the past ten years and is one of the fastest growing sports in the UK. More and more women's teams are emerging and the standards of skill and fitness, particularly at

the top level, are a revelation. Worcester Rugby Club has a thriving women's section with a senior team in the national first division, a second team and an under 16s team. The Club is always ready to welcome new members to their training sessions on Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

As hosts today we are naturally delighted that Worcester has such a strong representation in the current England squads. Scrum half Joanne Yapp, fly-half Karen Andrew and wing Nicky Crawford are included in the senior team and hooker Nicola Goodwin together with flankers Jaine Lock and Alex Pilkington are in the 'A' squad.

The next major breakthrough for women's rugby will be the emergence of more women coaches but with more women playing the game and gaining valuable competitive experience such development is only a matter of time. Today the England coach is Geoff Richards, a former Wasps and Australia full-back in his playing days. He is assisted by forwards coach and player development manager Rob Drinkwater, Carol Isherwood, Performance Director for the RFUW, and Team manager Heather Stirrup.

We wish the coaching teams and the players of both sides the best of fortune today and hope that everyone who attends the match has an enjoyable afternoon and takes away good memories of their visit to Sixways.
